# ON COMING TO MASS - SOME POINTS TO PONDER

As Catholics we believe that the Mass is the most important experience in our lives. We believe that Jesus Christ is fully present when we as people of faith gather to listen to him speaking to us through his word and to receive him in the Eucharist. When the Church teaches that coming to Mass on Sunday is an obligation the obligation involved arises out of our desire to encounter Jesus in this very real way. How could we not want to? What could be more important?

During COVID-19 the Archbishops and Bishops of Ireland removed the obligation of Sunday Mass as a necessary response to a most serious pandemic which was new and volatile, and posed a grave danger to health. The development of the webcam facilitating livestreaming into our homes came as a relief to many and facilitated us to join the celebration in a virtual way. It cannot however be termed participation in the full sense of being present in person in the gathering of the believers. The webcam continues to be a helpful tool for all those who because of limitation through age or illness are unable to come to Mass.

Presence, punctuality and participation are all key and necessary elements if we are to really encounter Jesus Christ who invites us to this deepest of meetings that is the Mass.

**Presence.** I choose to come to Mass, especially on Sunday even though there are other things I'd like to do, things which are useful, enjoyable and fun. My decision to go to Mass is my clearest declaration to God that he is the most important priority in my life. Jesus once asked his disciples: 'will you also go away?' My Sunday decision is my answer and either way it rings loud and clear.

**Punctuality.** We arrive late sometimes for all kinds of activities and for a multitude of reasons. If something is really important for me however I won't be late. If I'm regularly late, unless for a serious reason beyond my control, what does that say to me about the place of Mass in my life?

**Participation.** Mass is not a performance or a show at which I am an onlooker. Neither is it a form of entertainment or a distraction. Mass is a meeting, an encounter with God who speaks, listens, and gives us himself as food for our journey with all its ups and downs. Jesus wants to hear from us, he desires to talk with us, help us find ways forward, discern about our lives, enhance our relationships, enrich our minds and insights, free us from sin and darkness, fill us with grace, bless us and empower us to be people of real faith and hope and overflowing love.

#### **FIRST READING**

A reading from the Book of Ezekiel

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM**

Response: Our eyes are on the Lord till he show us his mercy.

To you have I lifted up my eyes, you who dwell in the heavens: my eyes, like the eyes of slaves on the hand of their lords.

Like the eyes of a servant on the hand of his mistress, so our eyes are on the Lord our God till he show us his mercy.

So I shall be very happy to make my weaknesses my special boast so that the power of Christ may stay over me, and that is why I am quite content with my weaknesses, and with insults, hardships, persecutions, and the agonies I go through for Christ's sake.
