Then he fixed his eyes on his disciples he said: How happy are you who are poor, yours is the Kingdom of God. Happy you who are hungry now you shall be satisfied. Happy you who weep now you shall laugh. Lk 6:17

The Sermon on the Mount is a collection of sayings and teachings of Jesus in chapter 5 and 6 of St Mathews Gospel. In Luke, chapter 6 and 7 the same teachings are called the Sermon on the Plain. This morning's gospel is Luke's version of the Sermon on the Mount. The Sermon on the Mount is a charter for living as a follower of Christ. It is an invitation to live like Jesus. The beatitudes are a charter for holiness.

The nine short sayings of Jesus at the start of chapter 5 of Matthew and Chapter 6 of Luke are called the Beatitudes. The Beatitudes literally means the beatitudes. The Blessed Attitudes. They are the attitudes of Jesus to different people, those who are poor, those who mourn, those who are meek, those who suffer persecution for justice sake, those who are gentle, those who are peace makers. They are attitudes to life which are the way of Jesus for us-the plan of God for each of us and for the church. Jesus lived all the things and did all the things that the beatitudes enumerate. And living the Beatitudes brought him to the cross, and beyond the cross to the resurrection.

The beatitudes describe the character of God or the way of God better than anything else in the bible. You can say without fear of contradiction that God is like this.

The beatitudes go against the normal way of looking at life and people. The world would say: Blessed are the strong, blessed are the powerful, blessed are the rich. The beatitudes turn that kind of thinking on its head. Blessed are the poor in spirit, blessed are those who mourn, blessed are the peacemakers

FIRST READING

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

'The Lord says this:

'A curse on the man who puts his trust in man, who relies on things of flesh, whose heart turns from the Lord.

He is like dry scrub in the wastelands: if good comes, he has no eyes for it, he settles in the parched places of the wilderness, a salt land, uninhabited.

'A blessing on the man who puts his trust in the Lord, with the Lord for his hope. He is like a tree by the waterside that thrusts its roots to the stream: when the heat comes it feels no alarm, its foliage stays green; it has no worries in a year of drought, and never ceases to bear fruit.
