"DO NOT BE AFRAID, ONLY HAVE FAITH"

In today's Gospel reading Jesus shows himself to be the Lord of life and death – healing the woman 'who had suffered from a haemorrhage for twelve years,' and bringing back to life the young daughter of Jairus.

Socially, Jairus and the woman are poles apart and have little in common, yet, in both cases, it is their faith that leads them to seek help from Jesus. Their actions invite us to reflect on our own faith.

When we are threatened by a terminal illness, or trapped in a hopeless situation; or when we feel that there is nothing to live for, then for us Christians, there is only one direction to look toward and that is towards God. Like the woman suffering from a haemorrhage, we must seek out Jesus, and acknowledge that it is He alone who can help us. "If only I can touch his garment"

Like Jairus, our faith calls us to mediate on behalf of others. When we support someone who is terminally ill, by our care, concern, and prayerful presence, we share in Christ's healing mission, enabling them to experience through us the love, compassion, and mercy of Jesus. "Christ has no body but yours, no hands, no feet on earth but yours." - St Teresa of Ávila

Every night on our televisions, we witness the awful tragedy of so many parents in Gaza weeping for their dead children. We are also aware of many parents, within our own circle, who mourn the loss of a child. To Jesus, these children are asleep in death. As the risen Lord he will come to awaken them. That is our faith. That is why the words "Do not be afraid; only have faith," are addressed to all of us.

Remember how generous the Lord Jesus was: he was rich, but he became poor for your sake, to make you rich out of his poverty. This does not mean that to give relief to others you ought to make things difficult for

yourselves: it is a question of balancing what happens to be your surplus now against their present need, and one day they may have something to spare that will supply your own need. That is how we strike a balance: as scripture says: The man who gathered much had none too much, the man who gathered little did not go short.

GOSPEL (Shorter form)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

When Jesus had crossed in the boat to the other side, a large crowd gathered round him and he stayed by the lakeside. Then one of the synagogue officials came up, Jairus by name, and seeing him, fell at his feet and pleaded with him earnestly, saying, 'My little daughter is desperately sick. Do come and lay your hands on her to make her better and save her life.' Jesus went with him and a large crowd followed him; they were pressing all round him. Some people arrived from the house of the synagogue official to say, 'Your daughter is dead: why put the Master to any further trouble?' But Jesus had overheard this remark of theirs and he said to the official, 'Do not be afraid; only have faith.' And he allowed no one to go with him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. So they came to the official's house and Jesus noticed all the commotion, with people weeping and wailing unrestrainedly. He went in and said to them, 'Why all this commotion and crying? The child is not dead, but asleep.' But they laughed at him. So he turned them all out and, taking with him the child's father and mother and his own companions, he went into the place where the child lay. And taking the child by the hand he said to her, 'Talitha, kum!' which means, 'Little girl I tell you to get up.' The little girl got up at once and began to walk about, for she was twelve years old. At this they were overcome with astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not to let anyone know about it, and told them to give her something to eat.
