Third Sunday of Advent: 15 December 2024

The Lord, the King of Israel is in your midst; you have no more evil to fear... the Lord, your God is in your midst, a victorious warrior... He will exult with Joy over you, he will renew you by his love... he will dance with shouts of Joy for you. Zeph: 3:14-18

Today is Gaudete Sunday in Latin or Rejoice Sunday. The word Gaudete or rejoice comes from the opening words of the entrance antiphon: *Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say rejoice. Indeed the Lord is near.* Today is the 3rd Sunday of Advent. We light the pink candle on the Advent wreath to remind us that the Lord is near. The 3rd week of waiting for the coming of the Lord. The readings tell us over and over again that the time of waiting for the coming of God is nearly over and we should rejoice.

The people of the Old Testament waited for 2,000 years for the coming of God. When things were bad, the longing for a Messiah became great. During their waiting the people of Israel had very unreal expectations. They believed that when the Messiah came there would be a perfect world. There would be no more suffering or sickness or pain. The desert land of Palestine would become green pasture land. The Messiah would put right all the things that were wrong with the world. The Messiah would come in the clouds of heaven and would enter Jerusalem in triumph and glory. Everyone would know instantly that the Messiah had come.

What actually happened was very different. Talk about the God of surprises. A baby was born in a stable because there was no room in the inn.

The 2,000 years of waiting of the Jewish people for the coming of the Messiah is the same as our waiting this Advent. The experience of waiting is the same the world over. During our waiting, we become more aware of the darkness of a world without God. We begin to long for the coming of God to fill the empty parts of our lives. During Advent we begin to long for a new light but in the words of R.S. Thomas the Welsh poet, *The meaning is in the waiting*.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of the Prophet Zephaniah

His winnowing-fan is in his hand to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his barn;
